Let's be counter-cultural in our narratives highlighting and celebrating our mission work and looking for ways that our ministries and communities, can share in the stories of compassion and hope for our world.

The Australian of the Year Awards slogan reads: *Reflect. Respect. Celebrate*. May our focus be on the brave, courageous, determined and inspirational people who make a positive difference in the world. Congratulations to tennis player Dylan Alcott, who was named 2022 Australian of the Year for his work as a disability advocate and congratulations to Anne Hetherington, the inaugural Chairperson of Mercy Partners, who has received an OAM for service to the Catholic Church of Australia.
