



## Third Sunday of Lent Walking on Holy Ground: A Lenten Journey

Reflection on the Samaritan woman at the well This gospel tale is full of confusion and culturally uncomfortable situations. ... The interaction between Jesus and the Samaritan woman is awkward. He shouldn't be speaking to her. She shouldn't be talking back to him. But I do like how she deems it necessary to explain the religious significance of the well... Out of this uncomfortable encounter comes a profound story of conversion and evangelization. Long before the Apostles seem to "get it" when it comes to Jesus as the Messiah, this Samaritan woman is preaching and converting her town to be his followers (Valders Paintner, Soul of a Pilgrim, 93).
